Graduate Women International calls for governments, legislators, civil society, and individual citizens to mobilise, unite and end all forms of violence against women

Geneva, November 25, 2015 - On this International Day to Eliminate Violence Against Women (VAW), Graduate Women International (GWI) calls for all legislation to be fully implemented to this effect. Gender-based violence exists globally in all strata of society and disproportionally affects women and girls of all ages in many forms - physical, sexual, psychological, and economic. From domestic violence, non-state torture by individuals such as trafficking and rape, to female genital mutilation (FGM) and forced marriage, perpetrators of this abuse can exist at home, at school and in public life. As reports of gender-based violence in conflict and during displacement rise shockingly, it is the duty of those in a position of influence to bring justice to the perpetrators, and for society to make all forms of genderbased violence unacceptable. An environment must exist where reporting of violence attaches no stigma to the victims in order to end impunity and bring criminal justice to those who are guilty of such violations.

All states should ratify regional and international instruments that address the issue, including the Council of Europe Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence, the International Convention for the Elimination of All forms of Discrimination against Women and the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. Governments and education providers must prioritise the security of girls by ensuring safe access and secure school campuses, including gender-segregated toilets.

GWI President Catherine Bell states: "Preventive interventions must be put in place including legislation, community education and mobilisation to change social norms. School interventions must target staff and pupils with gender equality training. Men and boys need to be actively engaged in recognising that their role in bringing about an end to all forms of violence against women begins at home."
